Course Title: Bloodborne Pathogens and Infectious Disease

<u>Course Goal:</u> This course, which meets the intent of applicable Federal regulations, will provide emergency responders with awareness-level information on blood-borne pathogens and other infectious diseases that may be encountered in the emergency response environment.

<u>Course Description:</u> Any emergency responder, regardless of their location or branch of service, may be exposed to blood-borne pathogens and infectious diseases (such as Hepititis C or HIV) in the course of their duties. In addition, the role of responders as "America's Domestic Defenders", places them at risk to exposure as a consequence of a WMD terrorist incident. This course provides basic information on the diseases themselves and routes of exposure as well as precautions needed to minimize or eliminate risk and regulatory requirements.

**Description of Methodology:** Lecture and small group activity

**Student Equipment & Supplies:** Pen/Pencil and notebook; one copy of the Student manual for the course in question
