**Course Title:** NFA Public Fire Education Planning (PFEP)

**Length of Course:** 16 Hours **Lecture/Lab Breakdown:** 16/0

Prerequisites: None

<u>Course Goal:</u> To provide those persons who have the responsibility for public fire education programs in their communities with information and concepts necessary for the successful planning and implementation of fire safety programs.

**Description of Course:** The basic concepts of fire education including history, fire prevention, high risk identification, and community representation in planning are covered in this program. Several areas of N.F.P.A. 1031 are addressed in whole or in part.

<u>Description of Methodology to be used: (Brief)</u> Combination of lecture, role play, brainstorming, audio visual presentation, group discussion, and practical applications.

Student Equipment/Supply Needs: Note taking material and student manual.

**Equipment/Audiovisual/Supply requirements:** Classroom, chalkboard or flip chart, screen, overhead projector, slide projector, cassette tape play with synchronized capabilities.
